Emergency involving one of the participants:

If you or another member of the trip has First Aid experience (and First Aid is required) – apply that. If no one has First Aid try to call for help in any way possible – i.e. send one or more members by foot to raise the alarm. Or try to signal other hikers who may be in the area.

Many areas are part of the 911 Emergency System. Find out before a trip which areas are covered by 911 and if they have cell coverage. Note: In many Parks you may be better off contacting the Parks Emergency Services directly since 911 numbers are often routed to major population centers where the dispatcher may not be familiar with the area or nature of the activity.

If the situation requires rescue techniques which may be beyond your ability or knowledge – again try to summon rescue by foot or by cell phone. DO NOT PUT YOURSELF (OR ANY OTHER MEMBER OF THE TRIP) IN DANGER IF YOU DO NOT HAVE THE NECESSARY TRAINING TO DEAL WITH THE EMERGENCY.
